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Estonia in facts

- Population of just 1.3 million but larger than Denmark and the Netherlands (45 339 sq. km).
- Over 2200 Islands, 1000 lakes and 7000 rivers.
- World's largest collection of national folk songs (over 133,000).
- According to WHO, Estonia ranks
 4th for urban air quality in the world.
- Most start-ups per capita in Europe.
- One of the highest adult literacy rates in the world 99.8 per cent, according to Unesco.
- 50% of Estonia's territory is covered with forest with well-kept wildlife



Did you know that in Estonia ...

- everything can be done online except for marriage, divorce and selling your house.
- 98% of people declare taxes online and it takes 3 minutes
- it takes just 3 hours to start a company
- digital signature saves 5 days a year
- 30% of people vote online





Higher Education in Estonia

- Since 2012/2013, higher education is free of charge for those studying full-time and in Estonian.
- Tertiary educational attainment is one of the highest in the EU – 45% in 2015.
- Foreign students comprise as much as 8% of the total student body, biggest number comes from Finland, Russia and India.
