General organizational findings

A Concept Paper was drafted for each BPF outlining the organizational process: a draft timeline, possible selection mechanisms for future participants, the language regime and a summary of the organizational inputs received from within and outside the EHEA.

Until the third BPF all the countries and organizations participating in the BPF were invited to nominate one contact person each for the follow-up. The network of contact persons has been engaged in all preparatory stages of the BPF.

The selection of non EHEA countries that were invited was endorsed by the BFUG on the proposition of the WG in charge of the BPF preparation and the host country, with consultation of the EU Presidency at the time of BPF.

A major concern was regarding the very weak attendance of EHEA Ministers: how given them a more prominent and active role within the BPF and how rethink the general agenda of the Bologna Conference to incite them to participate.

The language regime was English, with interpretation from and into several others languages according to the guests.

The number of delegates for non-EHEA countries' delegations (three to five) was a matter of discussion.
